# INTRODUCTION

- UEL (population ~3,200) has a unique governance structure, as the only urban area in BC directly administered by the Province, under the authority of the *University Endownment Land Act*.
- There has been a long history and interest in UEL governance, and the community is facing a number of growing pressures including: future development, changing demographics, infrastructure needs, as well as a representation gap.
- Urban Systems was selected by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs & Housing to undertake UEL Service, Structure, and Governance study, which began in late January 2020.

# STUDY OBJECTIVES

- Comprehensive study to inform the Province about the UEL's service needs, key interests, and governance considerations.
- The study has the following main objectives:
  - Clarifying the current state of the UEL
  - Projecting the future state of the UEL
  - Identifying service delivery gaps
  - Gathering perspectives of the community and other key interests through engagement
  - Assessing transition matters
  - Understanding the impacts of change
